BIODIVERSITY

Land owners or organisations responsible for woodlands, nature reserves and similar sites should be investing in long term management plans to sustain and enhance wildlife on their land. We can deliver anything from a one-off scrub clearance session to a fully integrated planning and delivery service.

GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE & URBAN REGENERATION

We engage with the local planning authority & town centre managers to promote greener, wildlife friendly urban habitats through planting & management. We offer advice & practical support on best practice. This vital work is improving wildlife corridors & promoting declining species, with a emphasis on pollinating bees and butterflies.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Positive management of woodland by surveying trees and proactively managing them is crucial as part of a defensible Risk strategy. This is an important aspect of woodland management that we are happy to discuss with you.

ACCESS AND ENJOYMENT

Land owners, particularly those in the public and third sector, are keen for the public to explore and discover the sites. We facilitate this by planning and delivering the maintenance and enhancement of existing rights of way and improving access through an area with a network of way-marked paths, gates and seating where appropriate.

INTERPRETATION

We can also develop strategic interpretation to dovetail with the access improvements. This ranges from interpretation boards at site entrances to welcome visitors, to simple ladder boards to denote ownership/ boundaries. This means visitors gain the maximum from a site visit. Often confidence to explore a site is increased if visitors have a leaflet. These can be made available in hard copy or downloadable versions.
